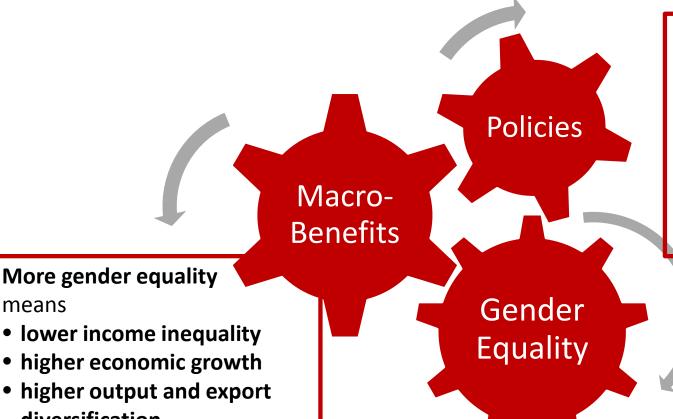


# Gender Equality and the Macroeconomy The Case of Rwanda

### Gender equality is closely linked to macroeconomic outcomes.





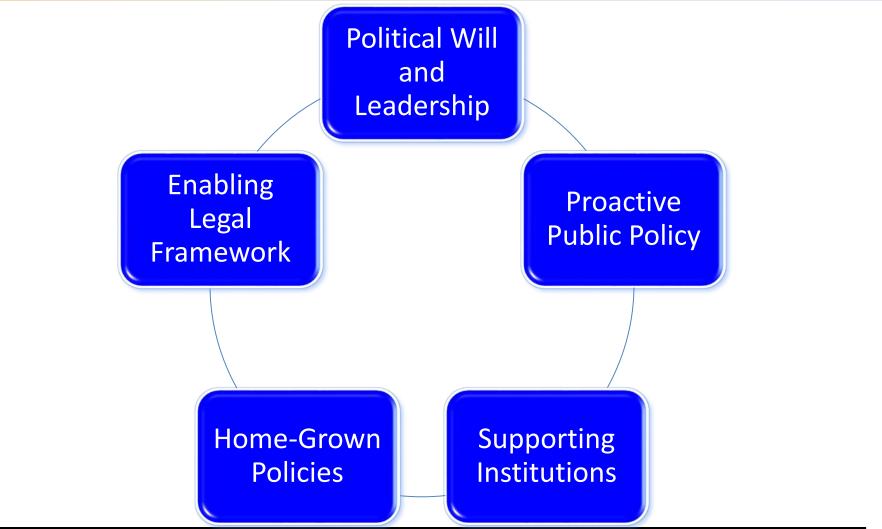
Which policies lead to more gender equal opportunities and outcomes, such as in

   Gender as cross-cutting issue in all development strategies
- Economic Development and Poverty Reduction Strategy, 2013-2018
   Gender equality as prerequisite to achieve equitable and sustainable development
- 7 Year Government Programme 2010-2017
  Government states priorities to be achieved in various sectors
- A dedicated gender "machinery":
   Ministry of Gender and Family Promotion, Gender Monitoring Office,

   National Women Council, Forum for Women Parliamentarians

### **Proactive Public Policy and Home-Grown Policies:**



#### Gender-responsive budgeting

every ministry responsible for ensuring that women's needs are integrated into its areas of responsibility and budget request

#### Education policy

progressive elimination of gender disparities in education & training & in management structures

#### Health policy

Health workers and vegetable kitchen gardens, community kitchen to demonstrate preparation of a balanced diet, the Shisha Kibondo program...

#### • National policy against gender-based violence

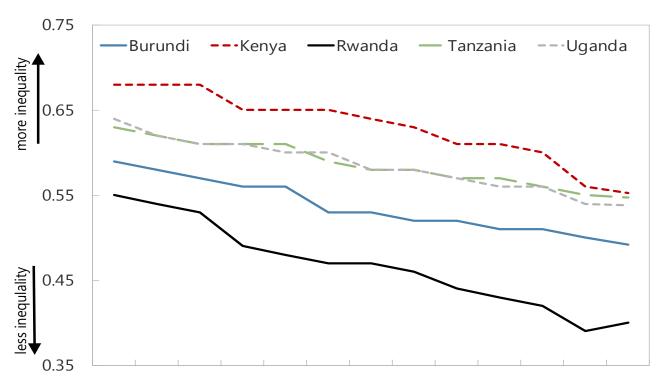
e.g. ISANGE program: One-stop center to provide 24-hour response to victims/survivors of GBV; umbrella Rwanda Men's Resource Centre

(Higher Values = Higher Gender Inequality)

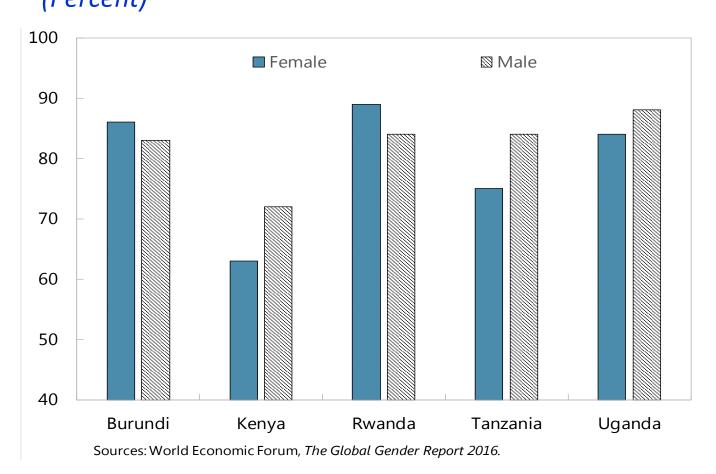

## Female labor force participation in Rwanda is similar to that of men, and to that of the EAC...

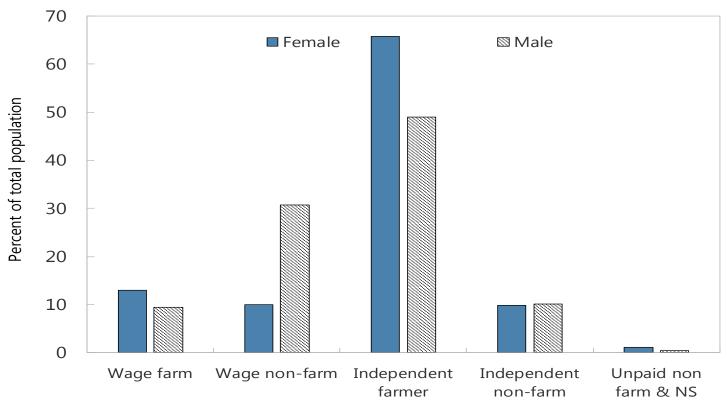


### **Labor Force Participation** (Percent)



... but women are less likely to be employed in activities that pay wages and more likely to work in agriculture.

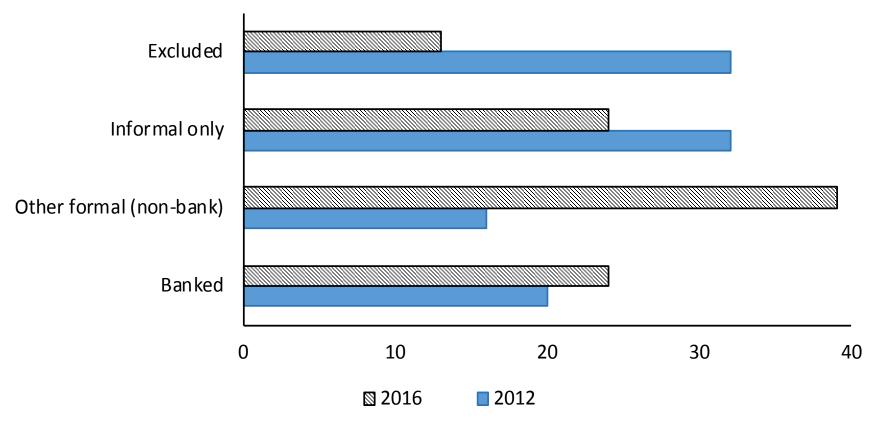
Rwanda: Work Status by Gender, 2014 (Percent)

Rwanda: Access to Financial Services by Women (Percent)

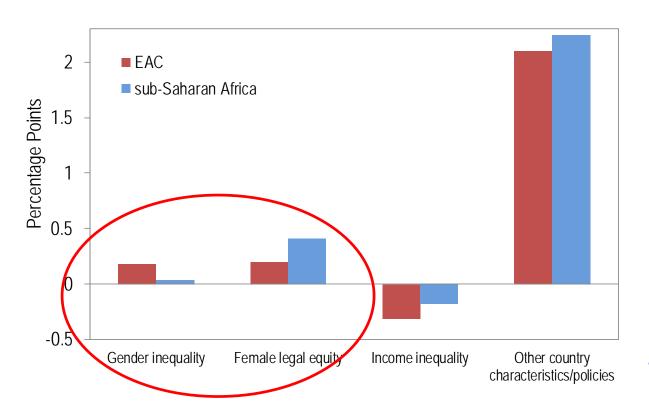

### Rwanda: Explaining the Growth Differential of with Sub-Saharan and the EAC

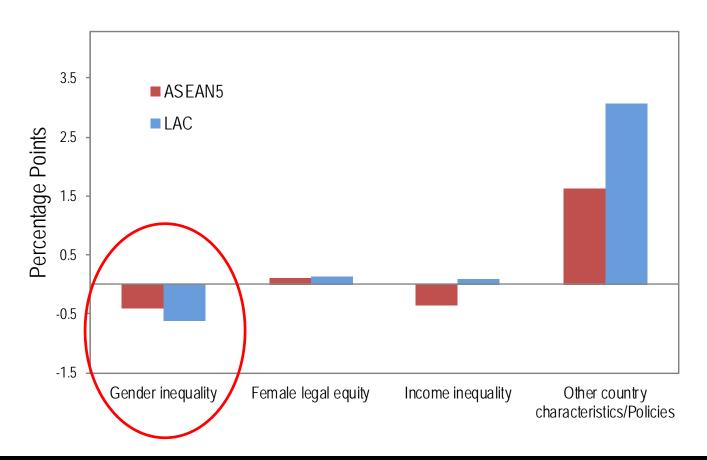


Gender Equality
