



Douglas Gollin is Professor of Development Economics in the Department of International Development at Oxford University. His research focuses broadly on economic development and growth. He has particular interests in agricultural productivity and the impacts of agricultural technologies. His work has also looked at the role of transport costs in shaping spatial patterns of development; the importance of small firms and self employment in poor countries; and the macroeconomic effects of disease. Professor Gollin joined Oxford in October 2012 after spending sixteen years on the faculty of Williams College in the United States, where he retains an affiliation. He his current research projects include work in Ethiopia, Ghana, Tanzania, and Uganda. He is a managing editor for the *Journal of African Economies* and an associate editor for the *Journal of Development Economics*. Professor Gollin holds an A.B. degree in history and literature from Harvard University and an M.A. in international relations from Yale University. He received his PhD in economics from the University of Minnesota in 1996.
